The Syntax of Greek and Latin 4: Displaced and discontinuous constituents


1 Displaced constituents

- We expect subject to appear next to VP in S, object to appear next to V in VP etc. ...
- ... but many constituents normally appear in positions other than those predicted by the rules given so far

stellae [quas Graeci cometas uocant] obj precedes subj in RC quem Graeci conati sunt interficere? obj stands first in S


- Relative and interrogative (*wh-*) elements normally stand first in their clauses or sentences by virtue of their function:
 - relative pronoun binds to an antecedent (stellae)
 - interrogative binds an unknown variable:
 'for which X did the Greeks try to kill X'
- Therefore we need rules of displacement (=transformations) which move elements to designated locations under specific circumstances

quem Graeci conati sunt interficere?

- If an qu-element is part of a larger unit, it may move independently
- · Alternatively, the whole unit may move



2 Topicalisation

- Topic = a part of a sentence seen as corresponding to what the sentence as a whole is about
 I see <u>wine</u> as a anecessity. (topic marked by intonation)
- Topicalisation = process of forming derived construction with constituent marked as a topic
 [NP Wine] [NP I] [VP see [t] as a necessity]

Italiam utroque mari duae classes, proximumque Galliae litus rostratae naues praesidebant Italy on both seas was guarded by fleets, and the contiguous coast of Gaul by ships of war

[Italiam]_i utroque mari duae classes [t_i] ..., [proximumque Galliae litus]_i rostratae naues praesidebant [t_i]

3 Focalisation

Process of forming a derived construction to give a constituent special emphasis or focus:
 I would cheat in exams [PP under no circumstances]
 [PP Under no circumstances] would I cheat in exams [t]

4 Topicalisation and focalisation are different

• In English, focalisation triggers auxiliary inversion (like in questions):

I would cheat in exams [PP under no circumstances]

[PP Under no circumstances] would I cheat in exams [t]

• But topicalisation does not:


[PP In examinations] I would cheat [t] under no circumstances

• Both topicalisation and focalisation can happen together:

[In examinations]_i [under no circumstances]_i would I cheat [t_i] [t_j]

- But the order appears to be [TOPIC] [FOCUS] ...:
- [Under no circumstances]_i [in examinations]_i would I cheat [t_i] [t_j]
